Families from Ukraine

You may well be aware that many of the residents of Balcombe are keen to support families forced to leave their homes in Ukraine. In addition to sending money, clothes, toys and other items to support the work going on in bordering countries, some households in the village have decided to become sponsors of a Ukrainian family and offer them a temporary home here. I understand that the first Ukrainian family are due to arrive in a week or so with a few others in the following weeks.

Some of these families will include primary school age children and we are very much looking forward to welcoming them, into not only our village community, but also our school. West Sussex Local Authority have said that these children will need to go through the usual admissions procedure, so it may take a little while to organise, but we hope that we will be able to offer some provision early on in the Summer Term.

Aside from coping with the trauma of what has happened to them, the children will obviously find the language barrier difficult, at least initially. With this in mind, we would welcome volunteers to come into school to help integrate our new arrivals, whether it be to play games, to help with learning, or just to be a "go to" adult. We have already had offers from three members of the community to help, some with

very welcome language skills, but would still appreciate more. If you would be willing and able to give up some free time, please contact the school office so that we can ensure that all DBS checks can be carried out.

Nature Ninjas

The heavy groundwork on the Nature Ninjas site has now been completed, which means that from the start of the Summer Term, our Nature Ninja sessions will start. More information about this will be sent separately.

Pupils with Covid

When children feel too unwell to attend school they should remain at home until they feel better, irrespective of any symptoms they may be exhibiting. In the case of Covid, the NHS website now lists possible symptoms as:


- a high temperature or shivering (chills) –
 a high temperature means you feel hot to
 touch on your chest or back (you do not
 need to measure your temperature)
- a new, continuous cough this means coughing a lot for more than an hour, or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours
- a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste
- shortness of breath
- · feeling tired or exhausted
- an aching body
- a headache
- a sore throat
- a blocked or runny nose
- loss of appetite
- diarrhoea
- feeling sick or being sick

Following the advice from the Department for Education, we ask that children with Covid remain away from school for at least three days

after exhibiting symptoms and do not return even when feeling better, if they still have a **high temperature**. Any child with a high temperature, even with no other symptoms should be kept at home.

We appreciate that Lateral flow Tests are now harder to come by, but in the interests of minimising the spread of Covid within school, would appreciate it if pupils who have had Covid, have a negative LFT before returning.

Guidance regarding staying at home if you or your child have symptoms or have tested positive for Covid is as follows:

Children going home with adults other than parents

In order to make things as simple and safe as possible, you will soon receive an email asking you to nominate up to three additional adults who may take your child home. This will mean that there is no need for you to email or ring us if, at short notice, your child needs to be collected by one of the named adults. Until we get this set up, or if you want to give permission for an additional adult, please ring or email the office on the day in question. Please do not email the class teachers directly as they are unlikely to check emails during the day and if the email is sent several days in advance, it is likely that the message will be forgotten.

Hopefully, the new system will help the efficiency of both parents and the office.

Parents in school

If we are able to keep Covid cases to a minimum as we have been, we are hopeful that following the Easter holiday, we will be able to invite parents back into school more often. For those parents who were not with us pre Covid, we usually have several opportunities for parents to come into school.

Each term, we invite parents to join their children to look at work and see inside the classroom. This is usually either at the start or end of the day for about half an hour. Children love the opportunity to show their work and classroom environment to members of their family and the teachers are on hand to answer any general questions that parents may have. To avoid upset to those young children whose parents (grandparents) are unable to join us, we ask that you let us know you won't be in and we can take the child to another part of the school to engage in a fun activity whilst the session is taking place. A date for this opportunity will be confirmed at the start of the new term.



REMINDER

Pupil Premium

If you are on a low income making a FSM application can greatly benefit your child.

It is often thought that parents of children in KS1 who currently receive Universal Free School Meals do not need to make a Free School Meals Application for the school to receive Pupil Premium. THIS IS NOT THE CASE.

Please contact the office if you think you may be eligible for Pupil Premium funding. Any accepted applications for Free School Meals (whether or not your child takes the meal up) attract over £1300 per child per year which the school can use to greatly enhance the resources available for your child both within the classroom and for extra-curricular activities. We may be able to help with school uniform costs, trips and other extra-curricular activities like swimming and music tuition.
